- * First child died, Alfalfa, Wa., Condon, Oregon.
- * They moved to Bellingham. Portland.
- * Childhood: 10 acres, cleared the land by hand; chickens, cows, garden. Jay worked at Carson Mercantile after his health failed. 1991 home on Smith-Beckon road, small house.
- * Three in a bed.
- * Snow on our beds.
- * Learned to dance while Mom played the organ.
- * Bathed in a round galvanized tub.
- * Kerosene lamp.
- * Marbles, card games.
- * Snowstorm over fence posts.
- * Mother got dolls for Arline and her sisters.
- st Mother weighed about 90 lbs, but could outwork anyone.
- * Lots of kids came to play and stay all night.
- * Breakfast in bed, after the girls had been to a Saturday night dance.
- * Arline got a job; \$50.00 a month and paid to have electricity put in the family home. The neighbors Put up the poles and strung the wire.
- * Milded Larson; Rowe family. Mrs. Rowe, a big dinner once a year and invited all the girls to come. Thank you.
- * Rode to birthday parties in a little horse-drawn wagon. Montchalin.
- * Carson:

7 saloons in Carson at one time; Theatre on the corner downtown; Gregorius, bakery. Confectionery/Drug Store; licensed druggist.

Post Office.

- * Arline was proposed to through the window bars of the Post Office.
- * Hardware Store, caskets.
- * Masonic Lodge was a store where her mother bought the Christma
- * Laundry across the street from Elsie.
- * Hotel located across from . . . one burned down.

- * Ford Garage.
- * St. Martin's Hot Springs.
- * Shipherd's Hot Springs.
- * All-girl orchestra played for dances.
- * Government Springs; dances out there, too; burned down.
- * Grade school by the Grange Hall.
- * Feet froze walking to school, lost runner in the snow. They called for my father to come and take her home.
- * Two levels of school: First grade through High School, 10th grade. Gymnasium.
- * Stevenson: llth and 12th grade. Some walked to Stevenson and back to go to high school.
- * Winter Sports:
 - 1. Coasting down long hills;
 - 2. Long ride on Fredrickson's hill;
 - 3. Long walks back up;
 - 4. Had sleds.
 - 5. Ice skating on St. Martin's pond.
- * Dr. McNary delivered Arline.

Holidays:

- 1. Christmas program. Father carried Arline to the school program.
- 2. Tree at school and home.
- 3. Popcorn, paper chains, colored.
- * Churches: One church: Methodist Church; her mom and dad sang in the choir.
- * Mrs. Beckon: She sang for nearly every funeral; big, strong voice; contralto.

- * Mother took in washings, cooked for the school.
- * Father had a nervous breakdown.
- * Cooked at Carson Grade School; hauled it a mile to the school.
- * Worked at Carson Post Office for several years.
- * 1934 married Amos "Jim" Reid, Catholic Church, in Stevenson.
- * Lived in a garage until the house was built.

- * Jim's father built the house in 1934.
